

## TRANS-BOUNDARY GUIDELINES IN U.S. AND CANADIAN WAT

## KNOW BEFORE YOU GO.

Educate yourself on local marine life and regulations before getting underway.

**BE ALERT and CAUTIOUS** on the water.

LOOK IN ALL DIRECTIONS and ALWAYS GO SLOW (<7 knots) when around any marine wildlife.

**PLACE ENGINE** into neutral and allow animals space to pass.

**BE PREPARED** to move away or shut down if nearby animals change course.

**DO NOT** position your vessel in front or behind wildlife.

**STAY** on the **OFFSHORE** side of all wildlife.

**AVOID** moving through and disturbing groups of any marine animal.

**LIMIT** any wildlife viewing time to 30 minutes or less.

**NEVER** approach an animal in distress.
